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AGENCY'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The Administrative Law Court (ALC) is an independent agency and court of record in the Executive Branch. The ALC has six (6) Administrative Law Judges (ALJ), each of whom is elected to a specific seat by the South Carolina General Assembly and may employ other staff as authorized by the General Assembly to hear and dispose of its statutorily mandated jurisdiction. Additionally, the Office of Motor Vehicle Hearings (OMVH), is a division of the ALC and has five (5) hearings officers and staff, appointed and hired by the Chief Judge, who serves as the Director of the Division. Although the actual number of cases filed with the ALC has decreased in recent years, the jurisdiction and complexity of the cases has increased since its inception. The OMVH has experienced a slight decrease in the number of cases filed over the past several years but that trend has reversed course this past fiscal year. The Court now hears certain case types involving all state agencies except those arising under the Consolidated Procurement Code, the Public Service Commission and the Workers' Compensation Commission. (See Age of Disposed Cases below for specific case types filed with the Court). The OMVH continues to conduct contested cases regarding certain decisions issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles.

The Court was created to provide a neutral forum for fair, prompt and objective hearings related to its jurisdiction. Though the ALC provides an excellent forum for the review of administrative law matters, there is always room for improvement, especially related to the time frames for disposing its cases (See Graph Charts regarding percentage of disposed cases). In analyzing the statistics for this year's disposals, there were a small number of cases that were disposed of well beyond the targeted time-frame. However, in some instances the cases extend beyond the target date due to the parties consent in an effort to resolve legal issues (e.g. awaiting appellate decisions). In all, there were three cases that were at least three to eight years old, which is a decrease from the outliers noted in last year's report. The Court's overall disposition time-frames are trending at comparable rates over the past few years, even considering these anomalies.

The Chief Judge is statutorily responsible for assigning cases filed with the Court to an ALI and is the Director of the OMVH, where the cases are automatically assigned to a hearing officer based on specific geographic regions. The Chief Judge is also responsible for the administration of the Court and OMVH, including budgetary matters and supervision of the support staff. The AUs are individually responsible for efficiently disposing of cases assigned to them and for the supervision of his or her administrative assistant/law clerk. Although the Chief Judge is the administrator of the Court, each ALJ has complete autonomy over the cases he or she is assigned to adjudicate. Each ALJ and his or her law clerk are responsible for ensuring the fair and prompt disposition of the cases assigned to their office. Although there are internal workflows and timeframes for disposing of cases, there is no required uniformity among the judges' offices nor are there requirements that mandate compliance with the timeframes or workflows. The Court's current structure, with six autonomous judges' offices, does not lend itself to centralized oversight of case disposition processes. Legislative changes would be necessary if the General Assembly determined that such centralization or oversight of case dispositions was necessary. If the Court is unable to accomplish its goals and objectives, the greatest risk of a negative impact on the public would be for due process to be delayed or denied. If a case becomes moot due to lack of a timely decision, this could potentially have a negative impact on the parties involved. Citizens should be able to rely on a court system that is fair and prompt. Further, a court that is fully funded without reliance on fees would also mitigate these issues rising to the level of immediate concern for all stakeholders.

A top priority of the Court (including OMVH) is protecting data and Information Technology assets against increasing cyber threats and vulnerabilities. The Courts depend heavily on network and information systems for essential operations and data security.



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Recently the Court initiated a multi-layered security and defense approach focusing on sophisticated and blended cyber-attacks. With both local and cloud-based security software in place the Courts web presences and local LAN have become hardened even further from cyber-attacks. Newly installed state-of-the-art firewalls, managed switches and strategist data traffic segregation added even greater cyber security, knowing the many risks associated with internet-based platforms to conduct business activities, like email, online data archival and search engines.

The Court will continue to develop and enhance a secure electronic filing system that is safe for all users, internal and external. Consolidating records while reducing the paper process will allow litigants faster access to the Court's information and provide electronic access to the public. In addition, the system and reduction of paper filings will increase the court's efficiency in processing and disposing of cases.

Much effort is being put into the cyber security education of all agency employees. Weekly safety briefs are a standard through email and on the Court's intranet site which is always accessible for users. The ALC's personnel stay informed by industry leaders to leverage best practices. We recognize that the first line of defense in maintaining the security and integrity of our IT assets and networks starts with informed IT personnel.






FILINGS AND DISPOSITIONS FOR THE COURT (EXCLUDING OMVH) SINCE 2012


